BIBLES FOR BAIRNS



Fewer than half of 0-2-year-olds are read to every day. We want to help change that.

Reading to young children helps them feel safe and loved. It builds self-esteem, grows their vocabulary, and fires their imagination. Reading the Bible can help bring a family together and closer to God.

Our vision is to offer every baby born in Scotland a free Share a Story toddler Bible on their first birthday. Every birthday after that, until age five, we will send a Bible related gift. On their fifth birthday each child will receive an early reader Bible to take them through their primary school years. The Bible gifts are wrapped by volunteers each month and an individual birthday card is written to every child. Before each package is posted we pray over them, knowing that God cares for these children and their families.

This program costs just £50 per family for the five years and means that from a child's earliest memories and through their school years, the greatest stories from the Bible will play a part in shaping their lives. Our aim is to register up to 1000 babies per year, with the cumulative cost per year reaching £50k.

BUILD MY CHURCH



"Build My Church" is a project inspired by the work of the tiny Scottish Charity, Bear Necessities for Bulgaria.

Thirteen years ago Bear Necessities began supporting the children of a small, primarily gypsy village in rural Bulgaria to attend school. Currently, Bear Necessities operate a soup kitchen and medical clinic, and provide winter boots to all school aged children in the village, as well as a few other key projects, and have been doing this with the support of Rumen Ganushey, a local minister.

This project "Build My Church" will work with Rumen to plant a church at the centre

of the large residential district of the city of Sliven. We want that church to have a truly holistic approach, meaning it will offer services for teaching and worship and prayer, but in time the vision is for the church to also provide free access to health care, food for the hungry, and training and support for the leadership of other churches in the district.

OPERATION HOPE



Egypt is home to the largest Christian minority in the Middle East with around 10-12% of the population professing faith in Jesus. However, as a minority they face varying levels of discrimination and suffer poverty and lack of education, especially in the more rural areas of Upper Egypt. In local disputes with their neighbours, Christians are often blamed regardless of fault and in some cases have been forced to leave their homes.

Working with a local partner, Release International's Operation Hope project serves Christian communities in Upper Egypt helping those who are facing extreme poverty and marginalisation. Families are provided with basic living needs such as beds, toilet facilities, kitchen appliances, food, and funds to help with construction of their homes. The project also helps families to establish micro-businesses so they can begin to support themselves, and it provides psychological and spiritual care through regular visits and discipleship programmes.

The Operation Hope project aims to support 2,000 people in around 100 villages in Upper Egypt each year.

Through the Guild's generous support multiple practical needs will be met; poverty will be alleviated; the impact of persecution and marginalisation will be reduced; Christian families will be assured of their value and given opportunities to build a future; and ultimately the wider Christian community in Upper Egypt will be established, strengthened, and enabled to flourish

PLAYFUL BEGINNINGS



Working together for these three years, let's build a house that lays a strong foundation for vulnerable families.

Together we will support families at Sunflower Garden in Edinburgh and Daisy Chain in Glasgow.

A child's early years can have an impact that lasts a lifetime. The Guild's support will ensure infants have the best possible start in life by developing strong, positive relationship between parents and children. With the ongoing impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and the cost of living crisis, parents are presenting to us with more trauma and distress than at any other time. Demand, and the need for your help, is greater than ever.

Research shows that parents who attend to their own emotional and psychological needs are in a better position to respond to their infants' cues and engage with them in positive ways. The Guild will support specialist perinatal therapy with creche support at Sunflower Garden. The team there delivers Parent and Infant Relationship therapy. Parents can access their counselling sessions while leaving their baby in trusted hands.

Daisy Chain is a community based, inclusive, early intervention project for children under 12, and their families. With your support, the team will work to improve children's health and wellbeing through play and nurture. Your help will strengthen family relationships and support families to become more resilient. Children with disabilities, from deprived backgrounds and facing home challenges can thrive here.

MALAWI - SCOTLAND PARTNERSHIP 2024

We were delighted to welcome five sisters and brothers from the CCAP Synod of Livingstonia to Scotland. The visit was part of our ongoing partnership between our two Guilds. Our visitors spent the first week visiting projects and places of interest then brought vibrancy and joy to our Annual Gathering before heading to various parts of Scotland to spend a week with Guilds

Iness Phiri from Mzuzu spent her time in Dunbartonshire, Jane Chirwa from Bandawe was hosted by Ayr and District, Monicah Mtambo from Mzimba was the guest of North Ayrshire and Daniel Mvula from Dwangwa was furthest travelled as he spent time with Guilds in Shetland including a visit to our most northerly Guild in Unst. Daniel also made it to the Machars in Galloway so he saw Scotland from top to bottom.

Finally, Gloria Mlowoka, the Director of the Women's Guild, who spent her time with Rae Lind understanding more about how the Guild works in Scotland. We look forward to seeing how these partnerships grow and develop.

PROSPECTS ACROSS SCOTLAND (PAS)

Cast your mind back almost 10 years to the Guild Projects. One of the six was Prospects: All Friends Together! The Project aimed to help adults with learning disabilities and autism and include them in all aspects of church life to build friendships with Jesus and other church members.

Prospects is now known as Prospects Across Scotland (PAS). Around Scotland there are 20 church-based groups, many of them started because of the All Friends Together Project. These groups raise awareness among Christians in Scotland about the needs of people with learning disabilities and autism and provide opportunities for them to take part in church activities. Michael a member of one of our groups, plays an active part in his church. This is how Michael feels. "I love the church. It feels like home to me - and God is always there for me. I am on the welcome team and a church cleaner - doing the hoovering and dusting every Thursday.

Sometimes I pray in the service. I have Down's Syndrome and that is good - my disability makes me feel special."

PAS highlights the gifts of people like Michael, to build up the church, by equipping churches to be more effective in how they welcome people into all aspects of church life.

I am privileged to have become a friend to my local group, JAM (Jesus and Me), a joint mission between Erskine and Inchinnan Parish Churches, who plan the programme together. They meet monthly and share worship which the members conduct. The enthusiasm which they bring is

fantastic. Worship is followed by a craft activity connected to the worship theme, and of course, like all Guild meetings, we finish with a cup of tea and a blether. This is the Guild Project still in action 10 years on: All Friends Together!

Iain McDonald from the JAM group, who is also a Guild member says, "I enjoy JAM. I like meeting people and getting to know folk from other churches. I like the drama best. I enjoy going to church and the Guild too, but JAM has a nice family atmosphere."

The link with the Guild started 10 years ago and is still there today. Have you been blessed with welcoming people with learning disabilities into your Guild? If you have perhaps you could let us know and if not, is there someone in your church or community you could reach out to?

PAS values the on-going links with the Guild. You can continue to support us with your prayers, by inviting a speaker to your Guild, or by donating or fundraising for us.
