# Property

It also has potential for a variety of other uses, such as a theatre, cinema or entertainment venue, retail space or community resource subject to obtaining appropriate consents. Conversion to residential accommodation would also be possible, again subject to the usual consents.


#### Local Area

Beauly is a popular and attractive town with wide range of independent retail shops including traditional Highland outfitter, baker, delicatessen, butcher and ironmonger.


A fuller range of amenities are available in Inverness, the Highland capital, which is approximately 21 miles distant.
